Epiphany "Star" Words

Epiphany is one of my favorite festivals in the church year. The festival is when we celebrate the magi coming to see the Christ child. The word *Epiphany* means the manifestation or revealing of the Christ Child. I began a "tradition" here at St. Paul my first Epiphany here in 2016. I invited everyone to choose a "Star" word as part of worship. The idea is to allow God to speak to you – to reveal Christ to you - through the "Star" word you receive throughout the coming year. Even the Congregational Council will choose a "Star" word at their January council meeting. It is inspiring and fascinating to hear the stories people share about their "Star" word and how it reveals Christ to them each year. My "Star" word for 2020, was *Thoughtfulness*. I have been led by the Holy Spirit in ways I never imagined to be thoughtful this year. I can't wait to see what my "Star" word for 2021 will be and how Christ will be revealed through it. This year our "Star" words will be distributed a little differently. There will be 4 options:

- 1) Chose your word at the Drive-thru "Journey to the Manger" on Christmas Eve
- 2) Chose your word Drive-thru style on Jan. 3 following Virtual Social Hour 11:30am-1pm
- 3) Chose your word online at wordoftheyear.me
- 4) Call the church to set up a time to chose your word

Nothing New Under the Sun (Hardly) by Robert McCloskey is one of the books about Homer Price. The title reminds me of Ecclesiastes 1:9-10. The Living Bible says it this way: "History merely repeats itself. Nothing is truly new; it has all been done or said before." What can you point to that is new?

There are many areas in our lives that appear to have new advances, in travel it's rockets and driverless vehicles, in communications we have cell phones, computers, the rapid exchange of information, and Zoom. For most of her life my grandmother cooked on a wood range-a microwave to cook food would have nearly been unbelievable. There are many times when we think we are encountering new ideas, new times.

2020, a new year and what a year it has been for all of us. A new pandemic, but we have heard of the pandemic of 1918, the influenza pandemic or the bubonic plague. In Biblical times the Egyptians experienced plagues. We have experienced great civil unrest during the year 2020. Many will remember the civil unrest in 1968, the civil unrest in 1861, Civil War. Why, even civil unrest in 1776. A year of political contention. What we have experienced are new forms of problems that have occurred in the past.

With the new year we can be sure that we will encounter things that are new. New inventions, new technologies, new events occurring in a different setting or way, new leaders, new ways to think, new ideas for us, and new ways to lead. Things may seem new to us, but our Lord has known all things from the beginning for His purpose.

So then....Happy New Year! Perhaps a better word would by Joyous New Year. As pastor pointed in the sermon for the third Sunday in Advent, there is a difference between happy and joyous. We often use happy to mean gratified as "I'm happy to be here," or "I'm happy to hear that," or "I'm happy to receive something" Joyous might be used to mean a state of well being or bliss. If I say I am full of joy, it is probably more a feeling of well being or contentment.

During the fourth Advent service Pastor shared some statements of belief by members, and one resonated with me, "I believe in joy even when I am sad." Even when we're disappointed, upset, hurting, or disillusioned the joy of the Lord is with us. I believe this joy in the Lord is the feeling of well being, contentment and bliss knowing that Christ with and in us makes us new and joyful each day.


## Don't forget to direct Choice Dollars®
