


Bob was a lifelong Lutheran and a member of St. Paul

COMMUNITY GARDEN ST. PAUL LUTHERAN CHURCH 2019 Report

This was the eleventh year for our Community Garden at St. Paul and it turned out to be a below average year. This year we donated **5310 pounds** of produce to Mid City Nutrition, the Blue Water Food Depot, and people at our September Food Truck.

Our production history is:

The Grand Total is 66,770 pounds since the garden was started.

We rented out 10'X10' plots for a deposit of \$10.00 per plot. If the gardener wanted more than 1 plot they could have more. We rented out a total of 56 plots to a total of 27 gardeners. The \$10.00 deposit was nonrefundable which will help pay the garden operating expenses. The gardeners were still responsible for taking care of their plot(s) and cleaning them up at the end of the season.

The Church's part of the garden was about ½ acre and we had a total of 44 helpers this year. There were 21 members from St. Paul and 23 non-members who helped in the garden. Six were Master Gardeners. All help is greatly appreciated and I would like to give everyone who helped a big thank you. We can always use additional help next year. Please let me know if you would like to help. Any help would be greatly appreciated.

We had a large assortment of garden produce consisting of green beans, cabbage, cucumbers, eggplant, green peppers, potatoes, several types of squash, sweet corn, tomatoes, broccoli and kale.

The operating cost for 2019 was \$1,036.95 of which \$539.97 was paid for from garden deposits, \$246.98 from WELCA at the church and \$250.00 from a Thrivent Action Team grant. Our cost of production was just under 19.5 cents per pound with all of our volunteer labor and no cost for equipment.

Every year we try some new things in the garden. This year we purchased a 4 wheel wagon for hauling produce, water, tools, etc. The spike tooth drag we got last year worked well. We tried a few other new things and I have some new ideas for next year. The weather in 2019 was probably the worst that we have had in the last 11 years as you are probably aware of. We weren't able to plant anything in the church part of the garden until June 23rd. But, next year will be better. We have about 30 yards of composted horse manure to spread on the garden next spring before it is plowed.

The garden was worked up and the rye cover crop was planted on October 18th. If anyone has questions about the Community Garden or how we do certain things, please feel free to call me at 810-434-2380.
