FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Friends.

Grace to you, and peace from God, our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ, the One who guides us along paths of newness and change. I am writing to you this month to bring two important items to your attention: changes in service order and the process St. Paul will be going through to update our mission and vision statements.

The worship and music committee met and discussed the lengths of our two services. We are aware that the service can be longer on Communion Sundays than noncommunion Sundays. The group agreed that it would be good for the whole to have an even amount of time for both services. We have decided on the following updates:

- We will be doing God Sightings on noncommunion Sundays only.
- The prayer for those suffering with addiction will be on noncommunion Sundays.
- We will be shifting the announcements to the beginning of the service.
- The Kyrie will be done on noncommunion Sundays. The Hymn of Praise will be on both Sundays.
- We hope to work toward having two communion lines at second service in order to keeps things moving smoothly.
- We will move toward having an Old Testament, Psalm and Gospel lesson as the readings on Sunday.

These updates will take place starting the Sunday after Easter, April 7th. If you have any questions, please feel free to reach out to me. We thank you for your commitment to St. Paul as we strive to figure out how to be a church together.

This leads me to the second important item. The council has discussed and agreed that it is time to look at our mission and vision statements and think about where God is taking us. We want to be very specific about the purpose of St. Paul here in the Port Huron community and how that is reflected in our mission. Starting on Palm Sunday, we will begin a two-to-three-month visioning process. This will include surveying the congregation and partners of the congregation, then having a workshop with the whole congregation on a Saturday in late April or early May.

The first step in the visioning process is determining our values as a church. This is where you all come in. In this newsletter or at the church, we have a survey to fill out. As part of this survey, we ask you to write down what you think are the top four values of St. Paul. Examples of values are:

- Worship
- Music
- Food insecurity
- Education
- Outreach
- Evangelism

These are just a few examples of values. Feel free to use Google for more examples. It is important to be clear that values represent who we are at St. Paul, not who we want to be. That is critical to the success of our visioning. The responses to the survey will be the basis for our work moving forward.

Please take time to fill out the survey and return it to the church office by April 7th. You can mail in the survey or drop it off on Sunday or during the week. The council will evaluate all the data received and have some ideas ready to go for our churchwide workshop at the end of April/early May.

It is an honor to live out the mission of Christ with you all, and I look forward to continuing the work for years to come.

To My Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ.

I have had the opportunity to attend a number of meetings with our church membership in the past few weeks. There is no doubt that everyone is committed to getting things done. The Worship and Music Committee headed by Ann Preimesberger was busy planning with Pastor the sacred



liturgy for Holy Week, which is the most solemn and eventful time of our church year. The Stewardship Committee members coordinated the cooking and delivery of a beef stew meal for the homeless at BWARM. Twelve church members attended the Properties and Management Committee meeting to discuss strategies for handling a long list of repairs and maintenance. Some of these projects are not only complicated, but will be costly. Priorities included roof repair and the acquisition of a new electronic sign as approved by the congregation.

At our church council meeting, a decision was made to begin the summer service schedule on June 2nd with a 9:00 AM service at St. Paul and a 10:30 AM service at St. Martin. This schedule will continue up until September 8th. Pastor Branden gave a presentation to council members on strategic planning and how we may engage in such planning here at St. Paul. We will begin this process by asking the congregation to fill out a survey on specific questions that pertain to mission, values and strategies. The council also gave its support for presenting the "Good Time Petition" to the congregation. If enough signatures are obtained, this petition would go on the November election ballot. Its approval would bring state prisons in line with both County and Federal prisons that give prisoners lesser sentences for good behavior. Mark Smith is leading this effort. So contact him if you feel you want to sign the petition. Many have signed already.

In addition to all of the above activity, two other task forces are in the making. One group is interested in resuming the "Corn Roast Event", possibly in August, the Saturday after Vacation Bible School. Also, some of the women of our Church want to plan for a retreat. You will hear more on these two events soon.

Finally, I would like to invite anyone who may be interested to attend a




Saturday morning breakfast meeting at St. Paul on April 13th with members from St. Martin and Our Saviour to discuss some common projects. Call me if you plan to come.

Ideas addressing the anticipated GWIP excess funds:

- Concern for students experiencing food insecurity over weekends and school breaks.
- 7. Living Waters
- 8. Lutheran Immigration & Refugee service
- 9. Samaritas
- Bonus checks issued to currently selected groups addressing homeless and food insecure persons.

Each of these would need leadership. Funds are available.

Other ideas suggested which would need congregational support and funding:

- A. Fixing the sign is a main priority. UNDERWAY

- C. Electric car charging station CURRENT ELECTRICAL SERVICE CANNOT SUPPORT THIS, A NEW LARGER SERVICE WOULD BE NEEDED
- A pole barn for gathering & storing garden equipment
- E. A federal grant to implement solar panels RESEARCH NEEDED TO DETERMINE LOCATION AND COST
- F. A telephone network for information distribution IN PLACE FOR ALL WHO OPT TO USE THE CELL PHONE CONNECTION; NEW DIRECTORY TO BE COMPLETED BY SUMMER




