Quilts of God

Over the years, I've been gifted a number of quilts -- large quilts, prayer quilts, old quilts passed down through my family. They've come from a variety of people and places, and they always come in useful this time of year.

My favorite quilt was a gift for our wedding. It's an absolute work of love and art. (Forgive me for not knowing my quilting terminology in the coming sentences.) The quilt is made with dozens of squares, which are made of triangles,

and those hold well-wishes from members at my first call church, St. John's Lutheran Church in Capac, MI. Every square has different types of fabric, from polka dots and floral patterns to scraps of color, and no two triangles that make up the squares are the same. Then, over the whole quilt, a sewn pattern of hearts weaves in and around every square.


It's clear the quilt was made with love, but more than that, it was made in community. People came together to write their well-wishes, and others donated their time and energy in the construction of the quilt. This doesn't even take into account the larger contributing community: textile creators, fabric store owners and pattern-makers. Whenever I am wrapped up with this quilt, I am reminded just how wide the community that surrounds me actually is. Think of your own quilting (or knitting or prayer shawl making) ministries that you've been witness to throughout your time in the church. Maybe your congregation makes quilts for Lutheran World Relief, or for seniors who are graduating.

Maybe you have the holy privilege of delivering prayer shawls that have been prayed over specifically for health and wholeness for an individual within your larger community.

Maybe your textile ministry is made up of a few faithful remaining members, and they are wrestling with how to carry on this faithful and patient practice.

Regardless of how vibrant or scarce these ministries are in your current or previous settings, they offer opportunities for connection, fellowship, spiritual growth and creativity. What might happen if we tried to use quilting groups as a model for other ministries in our congregation? How might an outreach change if connection and creativity were

just as important as fellowship and spiritual growth?


